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1. Introduction

1.1 Introduction

The National University of Modern Languages is a premier institute of higher learning. It was established in June 1970 as National Institute of Modern Languages, with the primary aim of helping people communicate and understand each other in different languages, and assimilate different cultures at the same time providing language skills to diplomats, defense personnel and individuals from the public and private sector. The institute was upgraded to the status of university and the name was changed to National University of Modern Languages. It is currently the largest and oldest university in Pakistan that specializes in linguistics and foreign languages in addition to other disciplines. With a combined strength of 11000+ students in various related disciplines, the university aims to become THE University that students in the region claim an association with. With the President of Pakistan as Chancellor, the Chief of the Army Staff as Chairman Board of Governors, NUML has gone from strength to strength.

NUML, as it is known to its student body and others, has grown and the growth has been phenomenal considering the adverse circumstances in which it was originally established. From a small building in Rawalpindi, to multiple, purpose built campuses and from a focused languages institute, to a fully equipped university is a long haul, but if the growth in the last few years is an indicator NUML the university can and will achieve its goals of developing into a center of excellence. The current regional campuses are located in rented buildings in Lahore, Karachi, Quetta, Peshawar, Faisalabad, Hyderabad and Multan, thereby ensuring that knowledge can be effectively imparted to students from all corners of Pakistan. With its changed status came the change in the outlook of the institution. From concentrating on increasing the number of languages taught, the university vision has broadened to embrace different disciplines and impart quality education in the form of various degree and non-degree programs.

NUML is an interesting amalgam of different systems and approaches: on the one hand it owes its name and fame to the various languages being taught while on the other; it imparts training and education in areas as diverse as Telecom Engineering, Peace and Conflict Studies and Chinese and Turkish Language Teaching. It is also the premier university in the number of foreign students which number about 400 in September 2013. A number of teaching departments at NUML also have foreign nationals as faculty and Heads of department.

NUML is a quality centric university adding achievements every year to its credit. Following is a comprehensive list of achievements in the last five years.

- Establishment of Confucius Institute, Islamabad is an important achievement as it is one of its kind in the whole region. This will provide state of the art facilities to learners of Chinese language in Pakistan and in the region.
- Establishment of Islamabad King Sejong Institute is another important achievement with the support of Korean government as it envisages at providing state of the art facilities for Korean language learning.
- Establishment of Iranology Center with the support of Government of Iran aims to support understanding and learning of Persian language and culture by declaring NUML as hub of its activities.
- Establishment of Yunus Emre Institute and Turkology Center with the support of Turkish government will provide facilities to Turkish language learners and collaborative projects between Pakistan and Turkey.
- Membership of International Academic Organizations such as Francophone Universities' Association, Rector's Association of Francophone Universities etc. is an important achievement as it acknowledges University's efforts and support for learning of French language.
- Characterized as Institutional Member Asia-Pacific Quality Network (APQN) and this is acknowledgement of University's strong commitment to quality assurance program and procedures.
- Offering MPhil and PhD program in rare languages, like Chinese, Russian, Hindi, French and German. This is a clear sign of growth and expansion in promoting research in oriental and occidental languages.
- Partnership Program with University of North Texas (UNT), USA for creating opportunities for English majors in both universities and collaborative research projects and faculty development.
- Holding of ASI of 100 teachers from all over Pakistan. This aimed at providing platform to teachers from across Pakistan for professional development.
- Arranging after school English Access Micro scholarship Program for students of 8-10 grade. This is an effort to reach out to community and especially to help less-privileged students in getting best language learning opportunities.
- Holding of International Conferences in Management Sciences, Urdu and International Relations as NUML's aim to provide professional networking opportunities and sharing of ideas by best minds in various disciplines
- Creation of space for more than 50 class rooms and other infra-structure including staff hostel, new cafeteria and students hostel.

- Construction of Foreign Faculty Hostel, new floors on Library, Roomi and Ghazali Blocks, New Jinnah Block and offices for faculty members.
- Establishment of Media Lab.
- Increasing the daily transmission time of University FM radio.
- Establishing Departments of Governance and Public Policy Studies, Peace and Conflict Studies and Bangla.
- Developing Engineering, R&D and Language labs as part of growing requirements
- Establishing Askari Bank Branch in University to facilitate university students
- Start of various Non-degree, Undergraduate and Master level Programs in Bangla, Punjabi, Engineering, Education Psychology, Peace and Conflict Studies, Governance and Public Policy that is in line with the mission and goals of the University
- Extending facilities of language learning to officials of friendly countries in English, Bangla, Punjabi, Pashto and other languages.
- Establishment of International Exams Center for Chinese, German, Korean and Japanese languages.
- Launching of research journals of Management Sciences, Social Sciences,

English Studies and Islamic Studies. These journals accept research papers biannually. These journals practice strict blind peer review process with a plagiarism check to ensure academic honesty and integrity.

With this promising list of achievements, NUML is striving for excellence in all fields. There are many future plans of the University and some of these in the next five years as follows.

- To assign special/unique status to NUML as a Language University with main focus on language learning with accepting the social sciences and technology as part of integrated multidisciplinary approach in language sciences.
- To establish International Campuses of NUML in China and UAE.
- To continue partnership program in English with UNT and to explore other opportunities with similar prospectus with other international institutions
- Establish Writing Resource Center for Researchers of various disciplines

1.2 Vision

NUML attempts to aim for a truly national and international character, having as it does a presence in all regions of the country. It sees itself as not only the premier languages university but a centre of excellence; imparting training and education in different disciplines. In the five year plan, NUML envisions joining the top 20 universities of the region and the top 10 in the ten years plan. Focus in the years 2005-10 was on languages and the humanities, in the years 2010-15 it is on engineering and social sciences, and in the period 2015-20 it will be on establishing programs in liberal arts.

Being an institution that revels in change, NUML is making a concerted effort to increase enrollment by 25% by the year 2018.

1.3 Mission

The mission of the National University of Modern Languages is to establish, sustain and enhance itself as a quality-centric higher education institution that provides an outstanding academic and research environment and opportunities for educated, productive, and responsible citizens for Pakistan and the global citizenry through academic, intellectual, personal and professional growth.

To advance its vision and mission of creating educated, productive and responsible citizens, the university focuses on 3 goals:

- i) high student achievement and success,
- ii) institutional excellence, and
- iii) responsible public service.

To achieve these interdependent goals, NUML aims to adopt a multi-pronged approach:

- i) induct distinguished academics and intellectuals to challenge and mentor students with potential;
- ii) encourage talented students devoted to the pursuit and advancement of knowledge;
- iii) establish broad-based quality programs;
- iv) provide state-of-the-art facilities and new trends in e-learning and information communication technologies;

- v) ensure exemplary administration and qualified administrative staff dedicated to the highest professional standards and service, sharing a common vision and an integral commitment to continuous improvement to meaningful education around the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of United Nations at all levels thereby ensuring competitive excellence and international compatibility.

1.4 Goal

The university aims to serve as a platform and connecting link for creating intercultural understanding and promoting dialogue and sharing among nations, cultures and societies by providing comprehensive academic programs in language learning, literature, culture, civilization and history of oriental, occidental & Pakistani Languages.

2. Governance and Ownership

NUML was given the status of university in May 2000 by the Federal Government in recognition of its achievements through promulgation of its charter.

In the charter, the Governing Authority and their role are defined as follows:

2.1 Governing authorities and their role

Following are the authorities of the University:-

- A) The Board of Governors
- B) The Executive Committee
- C) The Academic Council
- D) The Faculty Board of Studies
- E) Such other authorities as may be constituted by the Board.

2.1.1 The Board of Governors

The NUML Board of Governors is for general supervision and control of the affairs of the University including laying down the policies of the University, which shall consist of:

1. The Chief of the Army as Chairman of the Board ;
2. Inspector General Training and Evaluation Pakistan Army or his nominee
3. Nominee of the Chief Justice of Pakistan
4. Director General, Joint Staff Headquarters
5. The Rector
6. Secretary, Ministry of Defence, Government of Pakistan or his nominee not below the rank of a Joint Secretary
7. Secretary, Ministry of Education, Government of Pakistan or his nominee not below the rank of a Joint Secretary
8. Secretary, Ministry of Finance, Government of Pakistan or his nominee not below the rank of a Joint Secretary

9. Secretary, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Government of Pakistan or his nominee not below the rank of a Joint Secretary
10. Chairman, Higher Education Commission of Pakistan
11. Director General NUML
12. Senior Dean or Professor of the University
13. One or two members from private sector with established credentials useful for the University to be nominated by the Board ;
14. Registrar NUML as member and Secretary of the Board (not entitled to vote)
15. The Chancellor may, in consultation with the Board, appoint any other person including a linguist or educationist as member of the Board.

Responsibilities / Tasks of the Board

1. No act or proceeding of the Board shall be invalid merely for the reason of the existence of a vacancy in, or defect in the constitution of, the Board.
2. The Board may direct any officer, member of faculty or any other person to be in attendance during all or any part of its meetings.
3. The Board shall exercise and perform the powers and functions hereinafter specified, namely:
 - a) To hold, control and administer the property, funds and resources of the University and to borrow or raise money for the purposes of the University upon such security as may be required
 - b) To formulate or approve the principles, policies and plans governing the activities and operations of the University so as to ensure that the academic staff enjoy academic freedom in their research and educational work
 - c) To prepare or have prepared and revised from time to time rules and regulations for the efficient and effective operation of the University.
 - d) To review and approve the creation of any standing component of the University, such as faculties, and councils and other administrative bodies necessary to assist or improve the working of the University

- e) To approve the plans of work and annual budget of the University submitted by the Director Finance, the budget being based on the budget prepared and submitted by the constituent or affiliated colleges or institutes
- f) To require of, and consider reports submitted by the officers of the University relating to the activities of the University and the execution of the plans of work and to direct the Rector to submit reports relating to any matter specified by the Board
- g) To create such academic or administrative posts as it may consider necessary for the purposes of the University and to approve appointments to such of these posts as it may specify, including the posts of deans, directors, professors, associate professors; assistant professors, lecturers, instructors and demonstrators;
- h) To approve selection and appointment of all administrative and academic staff of the University, recommended by a Selection Board;
- i) To fix the scales of pay, allowances and honoraria for all the staff, both academic and administrative, commensurate with their qualification and experience, in order to attract the best talent from within and outside Pakistan for the University;
- j) To undertake responsibility for the financial integrity of the University, including responsibility for ensuring effectiveness of its future operations and their continuity and the preservation of the autonomy of the University;
- k) To approve all affiliation and other similar arrangements through which colleges, institutions or individuals may become associated with the University within Pakistan and abroad;
- l) To appoint from amongst its members such committees or sub-committees as may in the opinion of the Board lead to its more efficient and effective operations; and
- m) To take such initiative/s as it may consider necessary or desirable for the efficient and effective management and functioning of the University.

4. The Board shall lay down its own rules of procedures and may amend or modify them from time to time.

5. The Board may delegate all or any of its powers and functions to a committee, sub-Committee or to the Rector.

Meetings of the Board

1. The Board shall meet at least twice a year for regular or scheduled meetings and may meet at any other time at which a special meeting thereof may be called by the Chairman of the Board.

2. Not less than ten clear days' notice of a special meeting shall be given to the members of the Board and the agenda of the meeting shall be restricted to the matter specified in the agenda to be annexed to such notice.

3. The quorum for a meeting of the Board shall not be less than fifty per cent of its members.

2.1.2 The Executive Committee

1. The Executive Committee shall consist of following namely:
 - a) The Rector, as the Chairman of the Executive Committee
 - b) Director General of the University
 - c) Director General Human Resource Development, Pakistan Army
 - d) Director Naval Education;
 - e) Assistant Chief of Air Staff (Education)
 - f) Director of Military Training
 - g) Director of Administration
 - h) Director of Academics
 - i) Director Examination
 - j) Director of Finance
 - k) A nominee of the Ministry of Education not below the rank of BPS-19 officer
 - l) The Registrar, as Secretary of the Committee
 - m) Deans and Commandants shall, if required, attend the meeting of the Executive Committee.

2. The Executive Committee shall deliberate on various aspects related to the functioning of the University and recommend specific measures to the Board for approval and shall:
 - a) e and institute on all matters relating to the academics, including syllabi and duration of various courses
 - b) Recommend disciplines for all academic studies in the colleges and institutes and help in creation of necessary infrastructure for the same
 - c) Help induct highly competent linguistic talent into the faculty of each College to enhance the quality of education and research

- d) Lay down guidelines for proper and efficient conduct of professional examination at the Colleges or Institutes
- e) Recommend such measures which would foster and enhance interaction and collaboration between the University and the existing national and international organizations, institutions, research centers and foreign embassies
- f) Recommend apportioning of the national research and development budget for the University
- g) Work out and propose affiliation measures with foreign institutions and universities of repute
- h) Decide methods and strategies in order to ensure the most effective scientific and technological programs
- i) Co-ordinate with relevant Government Ministries, Universities, HEC and embassies
- j) Propose statutes to the Board for approval
- k) Prepare regulations for approval by the Board

2.1.3 The Academic Council

1. The Academic Council shall consist of the following:
 - a) Rector, NUML, as the Chairman of the Academic Council;
 - b) Deans, Commandants or Principals of affiliated institutions and colleges;
 - c) Representatives from relevant Directorates of the Armed Forces of Pakistan;
 - d) A nominee of the Higher Education Commission
 - e) Three senior-most heads of departments of different languages
 - f) Any other faculty member, on as required basis
 - g) Director of Academics shall be the Secretary of the Council.
2. The Academic Council shall act as an advisory and implementing body for the decisions of the Executive Committee on all matters relating to the conduct of

examinations, revision and updating of course syllabi, quality of education and duration of all courses including conduct of postgraduate classes in specified disciplines.

3. The Academic Council shall also help the Rector in evaluating, proposing and coordinating research and development projects and respective institutes and colleges.

2.1.4 The Faculty Board of Studies

1. The Faculty Board of Studies of each college and institute shall consist of the following, namely:

- a) Rector, Chairman, Principal, Commandant or Director General, who shall be its Chairman
- b) Deputy Dean or Deputy Commandant or Deputy Director General
- c) Heads of the Departments and Directors of colleges and institutes
- d) Selected teaching staff
- e) Representatives from relevant Directorates of the Armed Forces of Pakistan
- f) A representative of the University

2. The Faculty Board of Studies shall:

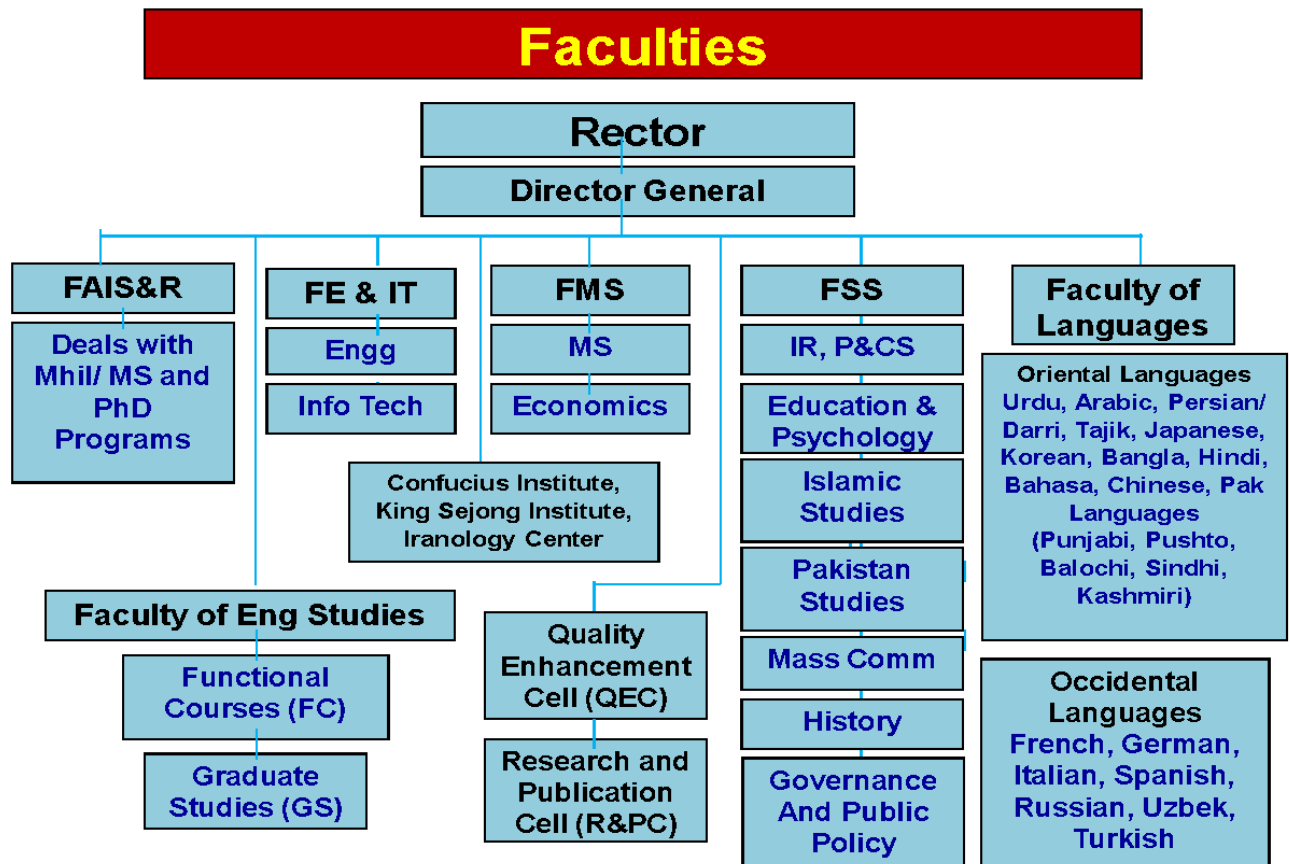
- a) Implement the decisions of the Board, the Executive Committee and the Academic Council on all matters relating to academic standards, examinations and research.
- b) Ensure feedback of the implemented measures on research and academic matters to the Rector.
- c) Work out and report to the Rector details of research funding required.

SELECTION BOARD

1. The Selection Board shall be responsible for conducting interviews and organizing tests should the need arise for appointments determined to be in its purview including all academic positions.
2. The Selection Board shall consist of the following, namely:-
 - a) The Rector, who shall be its Chairman;
 - b) Two subject experts in the subject concerned, drawn from a list approved by the Board of Governors but not serving in the university or its constituent units. In the case of positions of associate professors and professors the experts must be those to whom the research documents of candidates have been sent for assessment;
 - c) The whole-time member of the University Grants Commission or his nominee;
 - d) The Director General;
 - e) The senior-most teacher in the subject for which the interview is being conducted for appointment. In the case of non-academic positions the senior most officer in the area in which appointment is being made;
 - f) A nominee of the Ministry of Education not below the rank of BPS-19 officer; and
 - g) The Registrar shall act as Secretary of the Selection Board.

2.3: External Relations and Development

The International Liaison Office is managed by Registrar NUML and key objective is to internationalize the processes, services, research and academic portfolio of NUML in the region and across the globe. It plans and takes steps to ensure mutually beneficial collaborations with similar academic and research institutions so as both institutions share relevant research material, educational practices, cutting edge technologies and knowledge through relevant embassies, agencies and governments. The International Liaison Office provides a framework for international collaborations and monitors the effectiveness of these collaborations quarterly so as to use these as bench mark for future external relations of NUML.

NUML has signed Memoranda of Understanding with a number of universities and organizations for which the details are attached at **Annexure B**.

3. Environmental Scan

The need of the day is quality higher education and in this regard universities need to do far more than the current effort in order to keep pace with current and future requirements. Although enrollment rates are on the rise, much more needs to be done.

Pakistan is ranked as one of the lowest spenders on education in the region (Public expenditure on education lies on the fringes of 2 percent of GDP). Gender disparities persist in education; Pakistan has one of the lowest female enrollment/participation rates in the region. At the current rate of progress, it will be difficult for Pakistan to meet the Millennium Development Goals (MDG) targets on education by 2015.

3.1 Education sector in Pakistan (Higher education perspective)

Pakistan is still far behind in increasing enrolment in education as compared to other South Asian countries. Pakistan allocates lower percentage of GDP for education. Pakistan needs to spend more on education at primary, secondary and tertiary level education. There are still more opportunities in encouraging research activities in academia and linking them with industry and economic framework of the country. Gender is key issue in offering equal opportunities of education and specially higher education to all citizens of Pakistan. Pakistan needs to work hard to achieve targets on education Millennium Development Goals 2015.

It is hoped that the targets of spending 8% of GDP by 2015 in the new education policy will certainly improve the situation. However, the government recently approved the new national education policy, which stipulates that education expenditure will be increased to 7% of GDP by 2015

National University of Modern Languages offers opportunities for interaction, understanding and dialogue among cultures and civilizations through languages and literatures. The oriental and occidental languages taught at NUML provide a link for harmony and understanding amongst various cultures. The University adheres to the national educational goals of creating opportunities for undergraduate and post graduate students in fields including language and literatures, social sciences, business studies, information technology and engineering. The University aims to contribute in developing informed and professionally trained generations in Pakistani society.

3.2 Competitiveness of Universities/Institutes

The most important aspect for public/private universities is to remain competitive. Competitiveness can be achieved through various means. As a languages university NUML manages to dominate the translation and interpretation industry. Although there are a number of organizations in the private sector, NUML continues to hold sway over this area. Various embassies and diplomatic missions and multi-national organizations value the services offered by the university. Students of various languages are continually being absorbed into the diplomatic missions and NGOs, highlighting the link between NUML academia and industry.

Although a number of foreign universities of the UK and Australia have begun offering dual degrees or split degree programs, NUML remains distinct in its entity. Degrees are continually being offered in different disciplines but the NUML program of languages has retained its exclusivity.

3.3 Competitors: Public and Private Universities/Institutes

There are 73 public sector universities and 60 private universities in the country, demonstrating fierce competition in all disciplines, barring languages. NUML has sole dominion in the field of languages and the demand for more languages is ever increasing keeping in mind the shrinking of the globe and the desire for a global community.

3.5 Universities/Institutes Assessment tool

In the next five years, it is planned that an Internal Institution Performance Evaluation (IPE) will be constituted to conduct evaluation of administrative branches and regional campuses regarding their functioning, delivery of services and future development. The report of evaluation board, each year, will help all to make their administration, programs and systems more effective.

It is planned that in the next five years, each year the efficiency, capacity and human resource of administrative branches and regional campuses will be evaluated through a developed mechanism to ensure quality services and staff optimization.

The process of Self Assessment at Program Level is as under:-

- QEC initiates Self Assessment Process in departments and requests departments to nominate faculty members as QA coordinator and program team members.
- QEC conducts workshops on Quality Assurance Processes and Procedures for QA coordinators and program team members.
- Complete guidance is provided at all levels for Self Assessment Report (SAR) writing to Program Team Members through frequent meetings and visits to the department.
- Self Assessment Report is evaluated initially by QEC for clarifications or explanations (if required)
- Assessment Team is formed with the approval of the competent authority comprising one internal member and one external member.
- Assessment Team evaluates Self Assessment Report.
- If the report is unsatisfactory Assessment Team recommends revisions during the first visit.
- Revised Self Assessment Report is evaluated again by the Assessment Team.
- Assessment Team revisits the department after 4-6 months for evaluation.
- Recommendations of Assessment Team are incorporated in the Implementation Plan which is shared with the department.
- The department submits Activity Report based on the Implementation Plan.
- Quality Enhancement Cell writes Executive Summary of the Self Assessment process of the department.
- QEC shares the QA documents with the QAA/HEC as and when required.

4. Academic Programs

Curious thinkers and innovative minds make studying at the National University of Modern Languages to a rich academic experience. Internationally competitive programs allow each student and faculty member to create his or her own intellectual challenge.

The Academics Branch mainly deals with admission of Pakistani Students as well as International Students seeking admissions in various disciplines and research programs of the University. NUML offers admission twice a year that is February- June and September-January each year in addition to five week long summer programs, once a year that is, June-August. The NUML education system is semester oriented. Coordination & holding NUML entrance tests, prospectus, admission schedule, admission, copies of records, files, instructions, circulars, translation of documents & interpreter ship services, introduction of new programs/research programs, affiliation of institutions for award of degree/certificate etc.

4.1 Introduction of new programs and expansion of existing programs

The Academic Council comprises of Rector, NUML, as Chairman while the members are the Regional Directors of the respective campuses, Deans/heads of the teaching departments, Registrar (Secretary), and five eminent scholars to be nominated by the Board. It acts as an advisory and implementing body for the decisions of the Executive Committee on all matters relating to the conduct of examinations, revision and updating of syllabi, quality of education, duration of all programs including conduct of postgraduate classes in specified disciplines.

The first step in establishing a new academic program is the preparation of a proposal by an appropriate group of faculty or administrators.

The new academic program proposal should clearly identify the need and demand for the program as well as its relation to the strategic plan and mission of the university. Additionally, the proposal will need to address the proposed program in relation to similar programs within and outside NUML if such programs do exist.

Departmental Board of Studies: The proposal concerning the program is presented to the Departmental Board of Studies (DBOS). The purpose of DBOS is to advise the authorities on all academic matters. DBOS reviews the program and gives recommendations to Board of Faculties (FBOS).

Faculty Board of Studies: The purpose of FBOS is to scrutinize the scheme of courses and syllabi proposed by the Departmental Board of Studies (DBOS). The recommendations with the supporting materials are then transmitted to the Academic Council.

Academic Council: The results of the DBOS and FBOS, with supporting documents are then presented with recommendations concerning the undergraduate program to the Academic Council. The Academic Council (AC) will review the Program Planning Summary and recommend or reject or defer the proposed program.

The Executive Committee: Proposals for new academically approved programs or program modifications will be submitted to the Executive Committee for administrative approval. The Executive Committee conducts the final review. The CEC’s decision will be communicated and notified.

level. All the graduate level revision and addition is carried out under the Board of Advance Studies and Research.

4.3 Method of Delivery

The university is committed to providing its students a quality-centric learning experience, facilitating students by giving access to state-of-the-art technology as and when needed and ensuring availability of new and more effective ways of teaching and learning.

4.4 Recognition and Certification

NUML is an accredited University in the public sector that has the authority to award degrees. The degrees are issued on behalf of the University and signed by the Rector. Various external bodies evaluate NUML and the quality of its programs, based on stringent quality and professional standards. The most important independent entities and regulatory bodies evaluating NUML and its programs are the Higher Education Commission (HEC), the Pakistan Engineering Council (PEC), National Business Accreditation Council, National Computing Accreditation Council (NCEAC) and other regulatory bodies.

The Quality Enhancement Cell established at NUML is among the front runners in the country providing strategic quality enhancement standards.

The regular contributions of NUMLs faculty and students in national and international conferences are a source of inspiration for all those desirous of becoming part of high quality research program offered at NUML. The PhD dissertations are evaluated by the foreign experts and most of them carry appreciation of high quality knowledge generation and research initiatives in different disciplines. This networking of academicians and professionals bring credibility and attracts high quality doctoral students.

5. Students

NUML's standing as a teaching cum research institution is primary to its chances of inducting the best students. Attempts are made to induct students who merit admission, thereby providing excellent academic and professional opportunities. A commitment to excellence in education sets NUML apart from other institutions in the region while providing opportunities for students including efforts to increase diversity.

5.1: Academic Nurseries (Schools and Colleges)

The basic Academic Nurseries for the Pakistani universities are the schools and colleges which are affiliated with the Boards of Intermediate and Secondary Education (BISE) in the country. The basic and most important responsibility of these Boards is to hold timely exams and provide in time declaration of results.

The Summer Programs of NUML provide excellent opportunities for the students of school and colleges to enroll in short term courses i.e. languages proficiencies these short courses in the summer enable these students to learn about the university, its profile ,its aims and objectives and its different programs at bachelor and master level. They disseminate the information about university in their parent institution and localities .This creates a sustainable nursery for university programs as it has been the case in the previous years.

5.2: Academic Discipline

NUML is a world-class institution of higher learning with a total of eight campuses across the country. It aims to benefit the youth of various regions and to give students the opportunity to opt for the location of their preference. NUML offers its students a wide array of study programs at its eight campuses. These campuses cater to the ever-increasing demands of students in the fields of Humanities, Social Sciences, Computer Science, Telecommunication Engineering, Computer Engineering, Management Sciences, and many other disciplines.

Currently, over 11,000 students are enrolled in the one hundred and twenty one Non degree, Bachelors, Masters, MS and PhD programs bracketed under six faculties, having 31 departments and 2 cells.

There are different units working on academic disciplines of students.

Unfair-means Committee: The Examination Branch handles issues related to cheating in exams and use of unfair-means in exams through Unfair-means committee. The Committee handles all such cases in the spirit of NUML's commitment to academic honesty and integrity.

NUML Anti-Plagiarism Unit (APU) is established to address all plagiarism-related issues in academics at NUML. It strives for implementation of Higher Education Commission's (HEC) vision and efforts for ensuring standards and quality in research work, across all universities in Pakistan. Established around this goal, NUML APU aims at educating, training and facilitating Faculty members and students/researchers about measures to combat the menace of plagiarism. Moreover it provides support about using Turnitin, and HEC-recommended online service for plagiarism checking. NUML APU has devised an indigenous Plagiarism Policy for NUML, to ensure smooth functioning and clearer standard operating procedures for plagiarism-related instances.

NUML Anti-Plagiarism Policy

This policy applies to all written works, produced for credit/publication, at and for NUML, at all Graduate and Postgraduate levels, in all the programs. NUML follows HEC's plagiarism policy in letter and spirit. It has a plagiarism committee. Its theses are run on the anti-plagiarism software by QEC before they are sent for evaluation. Its assignments are also run on the software by respective course instructors.

National University of Modern Languages (NUML) is committed to establishing and sustaining a transparent, as well as creative, academic environment, for quality, meaningful and original output to the academia. NUML shares its vision of academic integrity and authenticity with the Higher Education Commission (HEC), which has formulated policy guidelines on Plagiarism. This policy broadly documents possible steps to combat plagiarism in academia, thus reinforcing and promoting the culture of academic integrity and originality. These steps are taken to ensure compliance of research work and publications produced in Pakistan, with international standards and quality. The HEC reinforces and provides the use of Turnitin, for checking plagiarism. The HEC allows candidates to improve their work, in case Turnitin Originality Report shows Similarity Index of more than 19%, where below 19% is permissible.

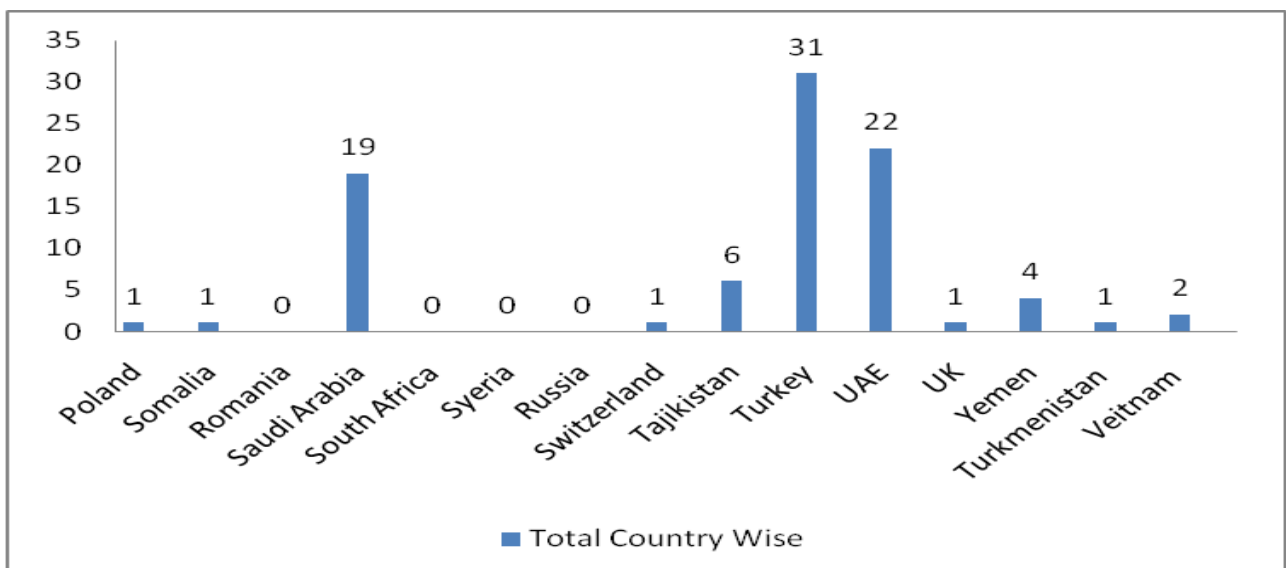
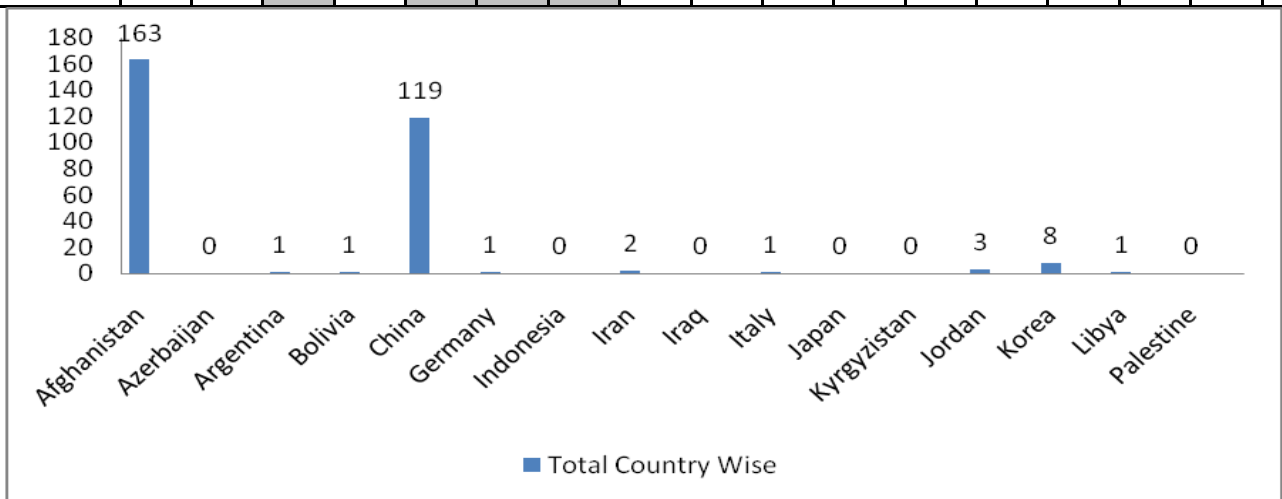

more clarity, about HEC Plagiarism policy, to instructors and students/researchers. It also addresses many indigenous plagiarism-related issues at NUML. The implementation of this policy will facilitate the training of individuals into a tradition of effective and standard writing.

Breathing in fresh air of new information, other than their prescribed courses, the students elevate their competence level and improve their communication skills.

The channel also collaborates with international broadcasting organizations like Deutsche Welle for literary and scientific programs. A proactive approach is adopted to involve maximum number of students and faculty members in the program. The program consists of talk shows, extension lectures, interviews, literary magazines and news bulletins as well as reports on the proceedings of the events at NUML.

Hostels

Three hostel buildings with dining rooms are available for a limited number of male students coming from abroad and distant areas in Pakistan. The accommodation is allocated on the basis of genuine need. One hostel complex for foreign students has been completed and the second is under construction.

NUML Libraries

The Central Library was founded with the establishment of National Institute of Modern Languages (NIML) in 1970. The institute was elevated to the status of National University of Modern Languages (NUML) in May 2000. The Library is housed in a two storied building and a basement having total covered area of 30115 sq.ft. The present library holdings is over one lac and fifteen thousand (1, 15,000) comprising books, journals, documents and non-book material on various disciplines. Functioning as language institute and later as a full-fledged University, major part of the library collection consists of the source material initial on languages. However, with the introduction of new disciplines like Education, Mass Communication, International Relations, Economics, Information Technology and Management Sciences, the Library has acquired adequate number of books in these disciplines as well.

Borrowing facilities are available only to regular and bona fide students of the University in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Library. The enrolled membership of the Library includes about eight thousand students and teachers. The open shelf access policy is in practice and the automation of the library is in progress. The online public access catalog (OPAC) of the library holdings is available on four terminals.

Medical / First Aid Facilities

National University of Modern Languages has its own Medical Inspection room and fully equipped Ambulance to handle any emergency and evacuation to nearest hospital. Medical

staff is qualified and well trained to manage emergency cases and capable to provide all necessary medical assistance.

Mosque

The university has a mosque at the main campus which facilitates faculty, staff and students.

Printing & Publication

Book Bank and Material Production:

The university Book Bank provides syllabus books on most economical prices. The reproduction section is equipped with modern high tech photocopying services and allied facilities.

Research and Publication Cell:

The section is engaged in editorial work for the University's publications, in the planning and production of study material and in the designing of testing procedures.

Sports

Directorate of Sports was established in 1980. Sports are great socializing force in the student's community. These bring the students together with emphasis on personal values and personality development. Participation in games and physical fitness is not only an objective but it is also vital for the health of youth. Survival of any nation, to a considerable extent, depends on the physical fitness. Proficiency in all walks of life is also largely depends on health of the population, especially for youth. Whereas food provides necessary energy for the body, physical activities (Sports & Games) tune up the human organs by utilizing body energy in proper physical activities.

The Directorate of Sports has been striving for and providing the opportunities to the students to have recreational activities such as games, after hectic studies.

To promote extracurricular activities and to maintain good health of resident students a gymnasium and fitness center fully furnished with sports equipments is established. Resident students use this facility for healthy and physical development.

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6. Research and Consultancy

NUML's Research and Publication Cell envisages quality research output of faculty and students through continued support and facilitation for national and international research collaboration.

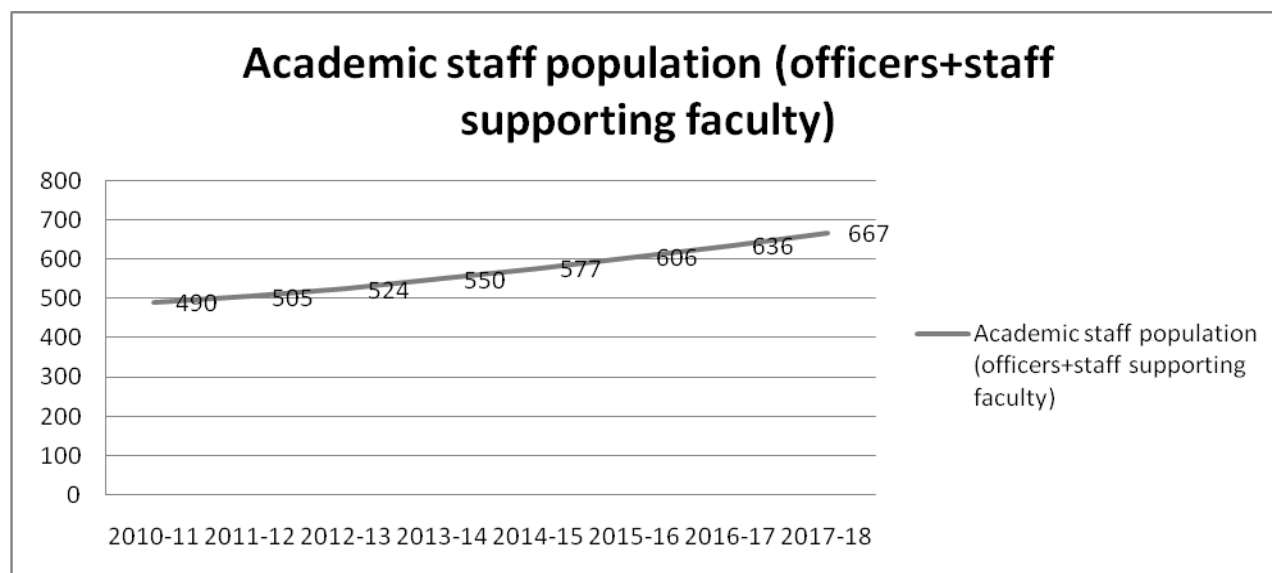

11. Networking

All Government and Non-Government organizations including Higher Education Departments of Provinces (Regional Campuses), Higher Education Commission, Finance Division, Government of Pakistan, Ministry of Science and Technology, Planning Commission, Economic Affairs Division, Local Authorities like CDA, RDA etc. Industry and Community will be approached to have their personnel trained in various languages prior to their assignments at national or international level.

11.2: Industry

National University of Modern Languages offers scholarship and research opportunities in more than 27 oriental and occidental languages. It also recognizes the increasing demand of technological driven interdisciplinary approaches in research. NUML offers research programs in other disciplines of social sciences including media studies, International relations, management sciences and economics. NUML is also offering programs in IT and engineering.

University play key role in economic growth of country by providing skilled personnel in relevant fields especially in Science, engineering and specialized fields in social sciences. NUML envisages a unique role in higher education, research and its linkages with cutting edge technological initiatives in industry in areas related to language sciences, language

processing, management solutions, digital learning ,information technology and engineering specially electrical engineering. To provide facilities of translation and interpreters to Industry, various Ministries, government and non-government setups. It is hoped that this networking with the industry will accelerate with the inception of ORIC (already mentioned in chapter 6)

11.3: Alumni

Our Alumni are a source of continued support for the University. The Alumni networks that serve the leading organizations throughout the country facilitate existing students in internships and job placements through the office of Students Affairs. Alumni networks meetings are conducted annually by Department of Management Sciences and IT to strengthen relationship with our most valuable stake holders.

It is planned that alumni network will be streamlined and strengthened in future for networking and linkages.

- vii. To take the pulse of the market about NUML graduates as to what difficulties they face while starting their career.

NUML has always been a front runner in reaching out to less privileged and under-developed segments of society and responding to natural calamities and commitment with full strength. As part of NUML's mission statement, NUML knows its responsibility towards the society in helping and serving communities through education and services beyond educational services that include financial support to flood victims, earthquake rehabilitation, poverty alleviation through involving less privileged in entrepreneurship activities and financial support to the under-privileged.

These activities include:

- Rehabilitation work for October 2005 earthquake
- Sending Relief Goods for Swat IDPs in 2009
- Sending Food and medicine in Hospitals and prisons
- Blood donations Days
- Helping Flood Affectees of 2010
- Helping needy patients in hospitals
- Telenor Pakistan Youth Summit Program.
- Helping less privileged students through student support program.
- Contributions in Pakistan BaitulMal support for Students

There is a comprehensive plan to outreach communities locally and internationally in the next five years:

- Increase affiliations with institutions for reaching out to community for humanitarian support and free books.
- Have more programs on the pattern of English Access Micro scholarship Programs for local less-privileged students.
- Provide facilities of qualified language teachers to institutions at national and international level to support language training of less-privileged communities
- Provide internship facilities in languages on merit to professionals in organizations providing humanitarian support in calamity hit areas.
- Provide translation facilities of books and other literary works in different languages.
- Provide interpretation facilities to local and international business community.

English Access Program is organized for improvement of English language competency skills of the under privileged children of Pakistan by NUML in collaboration with US state department. This also provides an opportunity to reach out to community and to promote higher education.

13.3: University/institute as a center of excellence for the community of the world

NUML realizes its active role in the community at national and international level for providing services through education and professional development of language teachers and other professional in the field of social sciences.

NUML is socially responsible institution of higher education providing best opportunities to all without any discrimination of class, color, creed, gender, race or economic background. It aims to provide support to less-privileged sections of society so that they also get best opportunities of education at par with the rich segments of the society. NUML shares with it students the ethical responsibilities ranging from providing scholarships to needy students, teaching students about ethics, promoting social / cultural and ethical awareness and sharing with regional community and groups, and helping them during critical situations.

A few examples include:

- Active participation in the Oct.2005 Earthquake relief works.
- Active participation in Flood relief works
- Active participation in relief work for the IDPs of Swat in 2009.
- NUML offers interpretership and translation services in many languages to a number of Governments, Public and Private sector organizations in respect of their development initiatives, capacity building, training & development, etc.

There is a strategic plan to make NUML (Main Campus and Regional Campuses) into Centers of Excellence in Pakistan and the world in the next five years

- Be a degree awarding university in all languages at all levels including MPhil / PhD.
- Be qualified to offer education majors in all languages
- Have solid foundation in various disciplines and languages
- Have rich base in teacher education.
- Have standardized curriculum acceptable at international level.
- Have adequate number of teachers and teaching assistants.
- Have enough teaching space and facilities.
- Have internship and translation facility.

13.4: External relations and communication

NUML is fully committed to plan and rationalize its activities to achieve its goals and objectives in higher education and research by keeping in mind the upcoming challenges of integrated and diversified interdisciplinary approaches in higher education and research. The Registrar's office manages the International Liaison Office for exploring opportunities and identification of areas of expansion in international linkages with various organizations and institutions. The aim is to negotiate and ensure sustainable professional discourse with international counterparts for mutually beneficial collaborations for faculty and student exchange and higher education programs and research projects.

The Registrar office is responsible for MoUs with reputed universities located in all regions of the world and actively implementing these MoUs to ensure that student/faculty exchanges, joint research, exchange of information, arrangement of conferences, etc. do take place effectively.

There are various opportunities available for NUML's external relations and communications through national and international linkages for mutually beneficial programs.

- To train faculty and students in USA and Chinese Universities.
- To increase the pool of foreign trained faculty in NUML.
- To improve the quality of teaching in foreign languages through periodic faculty exchange.
- To provide training at international level to own faculty in different languages.

13.5: Create a strong University's/Institute's Community

NUML hosts students from various international and ethnic backgrounds and always welcomes students from all around the globe. NUML provides excellent opportunity for students from different backgrounds to develop understanding, tolerance, harmony and acceptance of multiple viewpoints in multiple languages, cultures and civilizations. .

- A. In the next five years, Registrar's Office will act as International Liaison office for providing facilities to foreigners coming to NUML for education and language learning.
- B. There is a plan to create a strong University community in Pakistan and Internationally:
 - All US-partnership programs have been integrated as a group thus introducing NUML at international forum.
 - UNT-NUML partnership program has created a pro-NUML community in USA.
 - University MPhil and PhD program in various disciplines and languages is creating University community.

- Foreigners attending MPhil and PhD programs in NUML are creating a strong university community in Pakistan and at International level.
- Increasing admissions of foreigners at all levels.
- Providing faculty to International universities.
- Close liaison with embassies and foreign missions for translating their literature in various languages.

13.6: Develop a quality mindset

NUML's shared intentionality with the Higher Education Commission of Pakistan (HEC) and global demands on quality-centric higher education helped to ensure quality as its progressive mission. With our quality assurance framework that is in line with the framework of Quality Assurance Agency of the HEC, NUML is working hard to maintain the criteria of quality in all aspects of the university that affect the quality of learning and research such as, assessment and accreditation of academic programs and administrative policies and processes, quality scholarly output and its dissemination that reflect the university's mission to be recognized as an eminent center of learning that works with excellence, and also gives simultaneous assurance of international competitiveness and compatibility amongst the eminent centers of learning and research in Pakistan.

With Quality as its integer and Excellence in higher education as a qualitative strategic imperative, NUML manifested its progressive mission by establishing the Quality Enhancement Cell (QEC) in 2007. The QEC, as an essential component of NUML management, is dedicated to the implementation of quality assurance policies and monitoring the academic programs to ensure the implementation of quality standards.
