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Courses Offered

1.Certificate in Japanese Language

1. Aim

This course aims to develop students' foundational skills in the Japanese language, encompassing listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The objective is to equip students with the necessary language tools for basic communication and to foster an understanding of Japanese culture.

2. Scope

a) Objectives

- To develop proficiency in Japanese pronunciation, basic vocabulary, and practical daily expressions, with a strong emphasis on listening and speaking skills.
- To enable students to engage in basic oral communication and participate effectively in simple interpersonal dialogues.
- To provide students with an understanding of Japanese culture, traditions, and societal norms.
- To establish a solid foundation for further language studies and prepare students for the JLPT/JLCT N5 (Japanese Language Proficiency Test), which is internationally recognized as a standardized measure of Japanese language skills.

b) Core Skills Development

This course is structured to ensure that students acquire the following essential skills:

• Listening:

Students will listen to daily expressions and conversations, both through audio recordings and interactions with native speakers. They will practice repeating after listening to enhance their comprehension. Additionally, the course will include video materials that provide insights into Japanese culture, covering aspects such as societal norms, family life, business practices, the education system, and transportation.

• Speaking:

Students will learn to use common daily expressions and develop the ability to understand and respond to simple conversations in Japanese, thereby improving their conversational skills in everyday contexts.

• Reading:

Students will read passages that incorporate the grammar and vocabulary they have learned, using the Hiragana, Katakana, and Kanji writing systems. This practice will enable them to understand and interpret written Japanese at an elementary level.

• Writing:

The course will teach students how to correctly write Hiragana, Katakana, and Kanji characters. Students will also practice reading and writing various counting systems, both in Hiragana and Kanji.

A. Written:

i. Written Comprehension

- Writing comprehension this is a kind of creative work of students, in which they retell the read text in written form in detail or compressed, with or without changing the narrator.
- It is important to remember that the writer must not use the already given sentences from the text but transfer the contents as closely as possible to the text without disrupting supplies.
- This aims at enabling the students to comprehend the textual and contextual meaning of words, phrases, structures, and sentences based on:
 - Dialogues of introductory nature;
 - Simple situation;

- Short narratives;
- Texts of informative nature about the people of Russia and their country.
- Reports and commentaries on sports, weather, or items of social /cultural interest.

Topics Outline selected from textbooks.

ii. Applied Grammar

This subject covers:

• Different forms of tenses: -

Noun: Their forms and function in the sentences.

Pronouns: Forms, functions, and usage.

Adjectives: How to change the form of adjectives;

Verb: Their forms and conjugation like present, past, future, and present continue tenses.

- Sentence elements: -
 - Questions and negations;
 - Sub-ordinate and ordinate clauses;
 - Prepositions and prepositional phrases;
 - Antonyms, synonyms, homonyms.

iii. Composition and Dictation

a) Composition

- The purpose of this subject is to integrate the knowledge of simple sentences, and ideas and to compose them in the form of a short essay.
- Simple topics i.e. "About myself", "About my family", and "About my friend" are given to the students, and independent work is expected of them.
- Around 200-250 words essay is expected from the students.
- Mistakes are corrected and oral discussion is encouraged.
- Besides short essays, students are required to write simple dialogues about real-life daily situations

b) Dictation

- It aims at familiarizing students with the script of the language, correct spelling, and punctuation.
- By the end of the course the students should be able to write dictation of unseen text of about 200 words.

B. Oral:

i. Oral Expression

It aims at developing the conversational skill of the students on the dialogue pattern to express himself/herself on matters of daily life.

ii. Oral Comprehension

- Students listen attentively to the Audio,
- Analysis of the meanings of new words from the text, the construction of the most important syntactic constructions. Writing the words and phrases that require special attention from students.
- The Audio is to listen more times so that students can understand it and be able to answer the question.

iii. Reading Comprehension

This aims at developing the student's skills in:

- Correct reading and recitation;
- Reading unseen text and answering questions based on the given text.

5. General

- a) The candidates who qualified in each of the written tests separately and in aggregate in the oral tests will be declared successful.
- b) Midterm exams = 40%, Final = 60%
- c) The tests will be evaluated according to the approved rules and regulations for examination.

2. Diploma in Japanese Language

1. Scope

This is a beginner-intermediate course designed to deepen the Japanese language skills of learners who have already mastered the beginner level. This course is designed to help students reach the N4 level on the JLPT, the most trusted Japanese language proficiency test in Japan.

- Character acquisition specific to the Japanese language
- Beginner-intermediate grammar and vocabulary
- Beginner-intermediate sentence patterns and phrases
- Translate simple sentences into and from Japanese.

2. Duration

Number of Semesters: 2

Duration of 1 Semester: 6 months

Working Days/Week: 5 days

Teaching Hours/day: 4 hours

Starting dates: First week of September /First week of February

Assessment: Mid-term (40% weightage), Final term (60% weightage)

Each subject has an exam of 100 marks twice in the semester. 40% of mid-term and 60% of final exams are considered to calculate the final marks and grade.

The course covers the following aspects of the language:

A. Written

i. Written Comprehension Learning Outcomes:

- **Kanji Recognition**: Students will develop the ability to recognize and comprehend a wide range of Kanji characters, establishing a strong foundation for both reading and writing.
- Vocabulary Expansion: Emphasis will be placed on vocabulary acquisition related to daily life, professions, hobbies, and other common themes, enhancing students' capacity to understand written texts.
- **Reading Proficiency**: Students will acquire the skills to read various materials, including signs, advertisements, and simple narratives, thereby improving literacy in Japanese.
- **Cultural Context**: Through exposure to diverse reading materials, students will deepen their understanding of Japanese culture and society, fostering a more nuanced comprehension of written texts.

ii. Applied Grammar Learning Outcomes:

- Fundamental Grammar Mastery: Students will learn advanced grammatical structures, including verb conjugations and sentence construction, laying the groundwork for more sophisticated language use.
- **Grammar Application**: Students will apply grammatical rules to construct both simple and complex sentences in various contexts, enhancing fluency in both written and spoken Japanese.
- Verb Conjugations and Honorifics: Students will gain a thorough understanding of verb forms and the appropriate usage of honorific language, enabling them to navigate different social contexts effectively.
- **Grammar Reinforcement**: Through regular exercises, students will reinforce their grammar knowledge and apply it accurately in both casual and formal conversations.

iii. Composition and Dictation Learning Outcomes:

- Writing Proficiency: Students will practice writing simple and complex sentences using Hiragana, Katakana, and Kanji, strengthening their written communication skills.
- **Dictation Accuracy**: Dictation exercises will enhance listening and writing accuracy, requiring students to transcribe spoken Japanese into the correct script (Kanji, Hiragana, or Katakana).
- Sentence Construction: Students will practice creating well-formed sentences, integrating appropriate grammar and vocabulary for clear communication.
- **Cohesive Writing**: Students will work towards composing short paragraphs on familiar topics, developing the ability to organize and present their thoughts effectively in writing.

iv. Translation Learning Outcomes:

- **Basic Translation Skills**: Students will practice translating sentences and phrases between Japanese and English, focusing on the accurate use of vocabulary, verb conjugations, and sentence structures.
- Understanding Grammar in Translation: Emphasis will be placed on applying Japanese grammar structures and particles effectively, ensuring precision in translations.
- **Cultural Sensitivity in Translation**: Through translation exercises, students will develop an understanding of cultural nuances and their importance in conveying meaning accurately across languages.
- Advanced Translation Techniques: As students' progress, they will handle more complex sentence structures and expand their vocabulary and grammar knowledge, improving the quality and accuracy of their translations.

B. Oral

i. Reading Learning Outcomes:

- **Reading Proficiency**: Students will develop the ability to read and comprehend a range of Japanese texts, including dialogues, short stories, and other relevant materials.
- **Increased Reading Fluency**: As the course progresses, students will enhance their reading fluency, expanding their vocabulary and improving their ability to infer meaning from context.
- **Cultural Awareness in Reading**: Students will gain insights into Japanese culture and language through written materials, including understanding idiomatic expressions and cultural references, as well as the use of honorifics in various contexts.
- **Reading Comprehension**: Students will improve their ability to decode Kanji compounds, navigate more complex passages, and identify grammatical structures in written texts.

ii. Listening Learning Outcomes:

- **Key Information Listening**: Students will enhance their ability to extract key information from spoken Japanese, including understanding vocabulary and sentence structures in conversations.
- Understanding Everyday Conversations: Students will practice listening to dialogues, instructions, and announcements, improving their capacity to understand everyday spoken Japanese.
- **Listening Comprehension**: Students will engage in exercises involving various audio clips, designed to strengthen their comprehension skills and memory retention.
- **Contextual Listening**: Students will develop the ability to discern nuances in spoken Japanese, such as recognizing formal and informal speech, tone variations, and cultural context.

iii. Speaking Learning Outcomes:

- **Conversational Fluency**: Students will practice engaging in spontaneous conversations with peers and instructors, developing their ability to communicate effectively in a variety of situations.
- **Pronunciation and Intonation**: Through continuous practice, students will improve their pronunciation and master the correct intonation, rhythm, and stress patterns used by native speakers.

- **Dialogue and Role-playing**: Structured dialogues and role-playing activities will help students build confidence in using Japanese in practical, real-world contexts.
- **Confidence in Speaking**: Students will cultivate confidence in their speaking ability, preparing them to handle everyday conversations with ease and fluency.

4. Conclusion

These seven courses—Written Comprehension, Applied Grammar, Composition and Dictation, Translation, Reading, Listening, and Speaking provide a holistic approach to learning Japanese. 1. Aims:

The aim of this 8-week introductory course is to provide students with a comprehensive foundation in the Japanese language, focusing on developing basic proficiency in speaking, listening, reading, and writing. The course aims to familiarize students with essential language structures and vocabulary while also offering an introduction to Japanese culture, enabling students to engage in simple, real-world conversations and navigate basic interactions in Japanese.

2. Objectives:

The course aims to equip students with foundational skills in Japanese by focusing on the following:

- Mastery of Hiragana and Katakana scripts, with an introduction to reading and writing basic Kanji characters.
- Acquisition of practical vocabulary for daily interactions, including greetings, numbers, family terms, and essential expressions for shopping, dining, and travel.
